## 2011 Annual Parish Meeting Minutes

January 30, 2011

### Meeting was called to order at 11:17 a.m.

Pastor Chris opened the meeting with prayer. Susan Suter was nominated as Secretary for the 2011 Annual Meeting. Paul Henderson moved to accept, and Chris Beach seconded.

### Reading of the Minutes from the 2010 Annual Parish Meeting:

Chris Beach moved the minutes be accepted as printed. Dan Tines seconded the motion. There was no discussion.

### Nominations to the Vestry:

Pastor Chris explained the qualifications necessary to run for the vestry from the *Vestry Qualifications and Nominating Process*, adopted by the Vestry in October 2009. Four candidates were placed into nomination by Janice Dalgleish, on behalf of the Nominating Committee: Deb Lunney, John McKenna, Brad Spear, and Stacy Tines. There were no nominations from the floor.

Tellers for the election were Vestry members Tony Pelc and Mike Tyler. As the ballots were distributed, Pastor Chris reviewed the requirements for voting. Chris Beach inquired if the parish could take a vote by hand. Paul Henderson responded that he had researched the question and the parish by-laws require St. Mary's-in-the-Hills to vote by ballot.

As the tellers counted, Pastor Chris asked if there were any questions about the written reports. There were none. She then asked if there were any concerns or questions about anything.

Marj Mihalyfi asked if the ushers could pass the plate to the end of the pew. Pastor Chris replied that she has been to churches that do that and that we could try it. The suggestion was then made by Marj that the usher pass the plate down the pew, and the last person in the pew pass the plate to the pew behind them, and then pass the plate back up that pew to the usher.

Pete Trumbore commented that the doors to the Fellowship Hall are very loud when they slam close and asked that, during services, everyone be aware of carefully closing the doors. He said the noise of those doors slamming shut is very jarring, especially in the Choir Loft. Pastor Chris said the doors needed to be closed after services so that the church would be quiet for people who wished to pray.

Marj Mihalyfi asked for applause for the choir. Keenan Thomason, the Choir Director, was asked to stand by Pastor Chris to much applause. Pastor Chris also accepted full credit for the Gloria "because she likes it" and thinks it is more modern.

Showey Howey, as a member of the Fellowship Committee, suggested that there were probably people at the Annual Meeting who have never seen Family Feud. Nancy Gutelius then explained a need for teams to play Family Feud at a Fellowship Committee event on the next Saturday.

The tellers reported Deb, John, Brad, and Stacy were elected to three-year Vestry terms. Pastor Chris commented that she was looking forward to working with this Vestry, and that it was good to get a broad spectrum of candidates who showed a true picture of the parish: some from each service; some with families; some who have been in the parish a long time, and some who haven't.

### 2010 Treasurer's Report and 2011 Proposed Budget:

Marty began his presentation by thanking Janis Solack, Parish Administrator, to much applause, who he called the most valuable contributor to the church. He said he and Pastor Chris wouldn't know what to do without her. The **Summary of Financial Condition** showed a balance at the end of the year of \$16,000 more than the beginning of the year. He attributed this increase to Pastor Chris' significant amount of time off, an unexpected contribution, and pledges above the plan. He also noted an additional \$7000 contributed by the parish to causes such as Love INC; and another \$7000+ to the Parish Discretionary Fund. This combined \$14,000+ donated by St. Mary's parishioners is not reflected in the budget numbers. In comments regarding **the Budget** Marty explained the budget approved by the Vestry is 103% of the pledged amount for 2011; in other

words, planned expenses exceed income by \$10,000. The Vestry, he said, considers this a challenge and has ideas to make up that amount. We have cash in the bank, and that will go down if we need to use it to make up this amount. In 2010 the church paid Pastor Chris @ \$53,000 as opposed to \$57,000 in 2009; and utilities came in a little under the year before. The **Estimated Expenses** report shows \$166,000 in the Building Fund. The Bishop reimbursed the first \$100,000 of interest on the Fellowship Hall. We now have to pay the full amount of a \$40,000 mortgage payment. The mortgage will need to be refinanced in 2012. He concluded that in an environment where the economy is not good, we ended up with \$16,000 more than in the beginning of the year. He said that St. Mary's is doing a good job of ministry and keeping a stable financial condition. There were no questions for Marty. Chris Beach moved to adopt the 2011 Budget and Bobbi Patton seconded.

Pastor Chris told the congregation that Marty has "made noises about wanting to retire and I tell him, 'Not now!' She said he does a marvelous job and gives the church much stability. Janis, our Parish Administrator, is also the bookkeeper. Four people are signers for checks and that we have an excellent checks and balance system on our finances. She also said that Pete Trumbore, the on-going Warden, and Viki Toll, the retiring Warden did a very good job in 2010 and she thanked them. She informed the parish that the Vestry does the business of the parish between Annual Meetings; that they meet every second Tuesday of the month in the Bell Tower Room, and that all are welcome to attend.

### **Other Business**

Pete Trumbore, in the Vestry Report, explained that in 2010 the Vestry reorganized into small groups that took over different aspects such as Property Management, Evangelism and Stewardship, and Administration. This, he said, made a big difference and allowed more effectiveness and efficiency by the lay leadership. He pointed to accomplishments such as the renovation of the Hamm Room and the Bell Tower Room; reorganizing policies; and increased visibility of St. Mary's in different media. Pete said the lay leadership of St. Mary's needs to accept greater responsibility. He has been in parishes that tried to live off their savings creating a death spiral for their church. He said the challenges are not overwhelming.

Pastor Chris asked if there was any other business. There was none. She thanked everyone for coming and remarked that there were more people at this Annual Meeting than in the pews when she first started at St. Mary's.

Pete Trumbore made a motion to adjourn and Sara Munro seconded.

**The meeting was declared adjourned at 11:55 am.**

### ***Vestry Qualifications and Nominating Process*** *Policy Adopted by the Vestry in October 2009*

#### ***Qualifications:***

- 1. A candidate must be an adult communicant of St. Mary's, in good standing, and eligible to vote.*
- 2. A candidate must be committed to the financial support of the parish as indicated by being a "pledger of record" for at least six months prior to nomination.*
- 3. A candidate must be regular in worship.*
- 4. A candidate must, by personal example, demonstrate respect for the office of Rector and the lay leadership of the parish.*
- 5. A candidate should be committed to the life and work of the parish as demonstrated by participation in the fellowship, service, and outreach activities and efforts of St. Mary's.*
- 6. A candidate should be one who has demonstrated a willingness to offer their talents and energies to help fulfill the ministries of St. Mary's.*
- 7. A candidate should, by personal example, help to promote a welcoming environment to all at St. Mary's.*
- 8. A candidate must be willing to work cooperatively with the other members of the parish leadership team, both lay and ordained.*
- 9. Members of the same family residing in the same house may not serve on the Vestry at the same time.*

**Process:**

- *A three-person nominating committee shall be appointed by the Vestry no later than the October Vestry meeting. One of the three committee members shall be serving a term expiring at the next annual meeting.*
- *The nominating committee shall seek suggestions of candidates from the Rector, Vestry, and other members of the congregation.*
- *The nominating committee will consider any specific needs of the Vestry, i.e. skills, specializations, or interests, in developing a slate of candidates.*
- *The nominating committee will determine whether those who have been suggested meet the qualifications described above.*
- *Those who qualify will be contacted by the nominating committee to determine the individual's willingness to stand for election to the Vestry.*
- *The nominating committee will present a slate of potential candidates to the Vestry at the November meeting.*
- *The Vestry will approve a slate of candidates at the November meeting. The parish by-laws state that it is desirable, but not mandatory, that the slate of candidates include two more names than open positions.*
- *Upon approval of the slate of candidates by the Vestry, the nominating committee will contact candidates and request biographies as well as answers to any questions concerning the life of the parish, its direction, mission, and ministries that the Vestry may pose. Those responses will be published in the January parish newsletter, and posted to the parish website, so that the information is available to members of the congregation prior to the annual meeting. The nominating committee will work closely with the newsletter editor and webmaster to ensure that this information is submitted in a timely fashion.*
- *Parish by-laws state that nominations from the floor are to be accepted at the annual meeting. The individual nominated must be present at the meeting and consent to run; alternatively the person making the nomination may show prior written consent to nomination by the candidate.*

*In the event of nomination from the floor, the individual so nominated must at that time state how he or she fulfills the qualifications outlined above, and be willing to answer questions from the floor concerning those qualifications. In the event that the nomination is accompanied by a written consent, that consent must also include a written statement outlining how the candidate fulfills the qualifications outlined above. The accuracy of any written statement may be challenged from the floor.*

## **Rector's Report**

**"Chris' Corner": A Farewell Message**

The time has come for my final article to you as your Rector. This seemed so far away when I announced my retirement to you back in February. Now the change in our lives is imminent, and I am not comfortable with last times. I have read articles which describe the ending of a pastoral relationship like a death – but no one is dying I say to myself. Yes, our relationship will be changed, but it is not ended. My love and care for each of you will continue – and I hope you feel the same.

Other articles describe such a parting as similar to a divorce – but there is no rancor or dissatisfaction, on my part at least – so I reject that description.

As I reflect on this time, the description that I have come up with is that this time is more like a graduation. There is joy in our accomplishments but that is mixed with sorrow that things are changing. There is anticipation for a new future even as we wish things could remain as is. There are regrets and remembered disappointments, but they are far fewer than our successes and remembered joy. I find that I feel much like a parent who has guided, directed, encouraged, and supported; but who now must trust and let go of the reins so that you may continue to grow and to flourish. I feel like a parent both proud and excited for your entering a

new phase of living, yet worried whether I have given you the guidance and skills to send you out into the future.

But most of all, I feel thankful and grateful that I have been given the honor and trust to be your Rector for the past 17 years. It is you who have contributed more than any others in forming me as a priest. It is you who have supported and guided me in defining for myself what being a priest looks and feels like. My love and gratitude is overwhelming and I am humbled that you have traveled with me in my spiritual journey these many years. I thank-you and hold you in my prayers.

## **Warden's Report**

Serving on the Vestry during the past year were Melissa Breckenridge, Janice Dalgliesh, Maxine Henderson, Deb Lunney, John McKenna, Sara Munro, Tony Pelc, Sue Sanna, Brad Spear, Stacy Tines, Peter Trumbore, and Mike Tyler. Mike Tyler and Peter Trumbore served as Wardens, with Marty Tretheway as Treasurer. Kathy Pelc and Sheri Hart served as clerks of the Vestry, responsible for taking the minutes of Vestry meetings. We thank all for their dedicated service over the last year.

This was a momentous year in the life of St. Mary's, marked by the retirement of the Rev. Christine Humphrey after serving for 17 years as rector. Pastor Chris's last Sunday was Oct. 16, and since then the Wardens and Vestry have been responsible for the day-to-day operations of the parish while ensuring continuity in worship services and that the pastoral needs of the congregation are met.

The Vestry began preparing for Pastor Chris's retirement early in 2011. We devoted the first half of each of our monthly meetings to prayer and discussion of materials we were studying concerning healthy and unhealthy clergy transitions. By spring we had developed a transition plan, and after several special half-day Vestry workshops, the Celebration, Profile, and Search Committees were selected, their goals set, and the committees established. The Celebration Committee's work culminated in a wonderful program in October in which we celebrated Pastor Chris's ministry among us and presented her with gifts from the congregation. The Profile Committee's work began in September and continues. The Search Committee will take up its task when the work of the Profile Committee has been completed.

Since October the Wardens and Vestry have held several meetings with the Rev. Lisa Gray, the Diocesan Deployment Officer, and we will continue to work closely with her and her office as we continue through the process of self-study and discernment and then begin the actual search for a new rector. The Rev. Roger Derby will also be assisting us through this time as a transition and search coach.

We would also like to take this opportunity to acknowledge and thank the clergy who stepped in to act as long-term supply priests following Pastor Chris's retirement. The Rev. Chris Berg and the Rev. Bob Wollard served St. Mary's during October and November. The Rev. Bill Fleming served as our visiting priest from the end of November through the end of January 2012.

The Vestry worked to continue initiatives that had begun in the previous year, particularly in the areas of evangelism, communication, and outreach. We note the parish's ongoing support for the work of Love INC., which maintains a clothes closet in former classroom space of the undercroft as well as the 5<sup>th</sup> Monday community meal which St. Mary's prepares at Lake Orion United Methodist Church.

We continued to make our facilities available to the community, and we have hosted Red Cross blood drives in addition to serving as a polling place for local elections. The Fellowship Hall has also gotten increased use through an increase in events and activities planned and organized by the Fellowship Committee as well as the parish Youth Group. Completed renovation of the Hamm Room has allowed that space to be opened to the public for music performances, while renovation of Bell Tower Room has created new and badly needed meeting space for committees of the church and for the use of the Boy Scouts and other groups.

## Acolytes

Twenty-five (25) young people at St. Mary have faithfully served the minister and the congregation in 2011 by being acolytes or crucifers. They did this at both services on every Sunday, and at all special services, such as Christmas Eve, Holy Week and funerals.

- Junior crucifers processed those in the congregation carrying the Eucharist and offerings to the altar area, and led the priest to the back of the church at the end of the service.
- Senior crucifers processed the priest, Eucharistic ministers and choir, as well as distributed the alms basin to the ushers, and handed the wine, water, wafers and financial offerings to the minister.
- Senior acolytes turned pages of the priest's prayer book, helped the priest in preparing the communion table, processed the Gospel book, and lit and extinguished the altar candles.

These young people did this service to help the priest and the congregation in their worship. They did this quietly, respectfully, and without calling attention to themselves.

- two (2) new junior acolytes
- two (2) are no longer serving as of Fall 2011.

## Administration Committee

The Administration Committee (Maxine Henderson, Melissa Breckenridge, Tony Pelc, Deb Lunney, and Mike Tyler) have been meeting to go over concerns/issues needing attention to ensure that the administrative area of the church continues to run smoothly.

The following topics were reviewed and completed during the Year 2011:

- Policies and Procedures were reviewed and updated: Vestry Tasks by Month; Table of Contents; Spring/Fall Cleanup; Guidelines for Ushers; Guidelines for Vestry Members; Sunday Morning Procedures; Vestry

Qualifications and Nominating Procedures; Youth Program Permission/Emergency Notification; and Memorial Committee Guidelines.

- The phone issue in the Fellowship Hall is ongoing. It has been decided that a hard wire will be connected to the existing phone jack. Chris Beach has offered to help with this project, but will have to be postponed for warmer weather.
  - For security purposes, a webcam was discussed but due to the cost of the project, it has been put on hold until monies can be available.
  - The Bylaws and Rules of Procedure of St. Mary's in-the-Hills were reviewed for updating but have been put on hold for 2012.
  - The Evacuation Procedure is in the process of being updated.
  - The yearly employee evaluations for the Administrative Assistant, Choir Director, Nursery Aide, and Custodian were completed during the summer.
  - Janis was approved for a new computer, and the Rector's Office received a new laptop in April.
  - With the help of Tony Pelc, a new 3-year lease was obtained for a copier in November.
- The committee looks forward to serving St. Mary's again in 2012.

## Evangelism and Stewardship Committee

This fall was a very busy time for our parish. Not only did we say goodbye to Pastor Chris and begin preparing for our interim period without a pastor, but we also conducted our annual Stewardship Pledge Drive. While it seemed there was little time to think about “pledging”, the Stewardship Committee knew the drive was more important this year than ever. The committee challenged the parish to increase their pledges this year by 15% so that we could increase St. Mary’s budget by 15%, achieving a budget of \$200,000. The goal of \$200,000 was chosen for two reasons. First, during our search for a new rector it is important to represent St. Mary’s as a healthy, vibrant church. Secondly, there will be increased expenses for our church family over the next year, from supply priests to the interview process, to hiring a rector.

This year the Stewardship Committee held cottage dinners at parishioner’s homes, and at the church, as a way to disseminate information regarding the Stewardship Pledge Drive, as well as an opportunity for fellowship. A big thanks to the Flanders, Tines, Trumbore, Beems, Comers, Hendersons, Bobbi Patton, and Viki Toll for providing hospitality and a lovely meal for our church family.

As you can see by the numbers below we did not reach our goal of \$200,000, but our parish was very generous, and many people rose to the challenge and increased their pledges. It is not too late to pledge. If you would like to support the work done at St. Mary’s, please contact the church office.

Last April, eight St. Mary’s parishioners attended the Diocesan Conference, *Becoming the Household of God: Fireweed Evangelism*. This conference inspired our Evangelism/ Stewardship Commission to adopt some new evangelism strategies at St. Mary’s and to invite non-vestry members to assist them in their pursuits. The Evangelism Committee worked hard to spread the message that evangelism was not about gaining more parishioners or more money but to bring others to know and love Christ. To portray this message the committee introduced a few changes this year including:

- the use of a welcoming prayer to be read at the beginning of each service;

- the creation of an updated St. Mary's in the Hills brochure;
- instituting the delivery of a loaf of bread to visitors that sign our guest book within 24 hours of their visit;
- revisiting the idea of Invite a Friend Sunday, with more energy and effort than during past events.

Invite A Friend Sunday was held on Sunday, September 18<sup>th</sup>. The committee prepared for the event by calling each member of the parish and encouraging them to prayerfully consider a "friend" they might be able to invite. If your group is looking for an Outreach project, this might be something to consider.

**Love INC:** St Mary's still provides a home for the clothes closet operated by Love In the Name of Christ. Donations can be dropped off on Tuesday and Thursday in the morning. The afternoons on those days are when clients can make their selections. We are in need of a few volunteers for this ministry. We are looking for two people for the second Thursday of the month, one other person for the fifth Tuesday of the month and one more person to work on the third Thursday. Please contact me (248 628-4428) if this is of interest to you. Bed, Blessings and Beyond, a household goods ministry, and Little Luxuries, a personal products ministry, are at Christ the King Church on Drahnner Road. They are in need of two volunteers to work on the fifth Thursday of the month. We now offer free community meals to anyone who shows up (no questions asked) on four nights a week. Mondays are at Lake Orion UMC on Flint St in Lake Orion. St Mary's will again be providing the meals on the fifth Monday of the month. Tuesdays are at Immanuel UCC on Hovey in Oxford, Wednesday at Oxford UMC on Burdick in Oxford and Thursday is at Christ the King Church on Drahnner in Oxford. We still have our Gas Can Ministry to collect change (or folding money) to provide gas cards for our clients. St Mary's Gas Can is located in the Gathering Space. Our Laundry Ministry pays for our clients to wash their clothes at the Wonder Cleaners & Laundromat on M-24 just south of Drahnner. We can always use detergent and fabric dryer sheets for this ministry since we provide those for the clients. Just bring them to church, leave them by the gas can and I will see that they are taken to the Laundromat. Love INC is beginning the process of looking for a new home. The clothes closet and the office are currently in spaces that are not handicapped accessible. One place we are interested in is the former Senior Center in Lake Orion. More news on this subject as it becomes available.

**CROP Walk:** 26walkers (two of them furry) participated in the Crop Walk for 2011. The non furry walkers were equally divided between adults and younger people. The total of \$2,868.77 raised far exceeded our goal of \$2200. A big thank you to Maxine, Kathy Pelc and Erika West for heading up this fundraiser. Once again a portion of the proceeds will go to Love INC. The walk for 2012 will be held on Sunday May, the 6<sup>th</sup>.

**Crossroads:** On June 12<sup>th</sup> of 2011, many hands, including some folks from Church of the Resurrection, made light work of 1600 sandwiches and 120 gallons of soup to feed well over 800 people. Our Sunday to serve this year is June 10<sup>th</sup>. We are being asked to be prepared to serve 850 clients this year. Crossroads is looking for groups to make up the condiment packets that are given to each client. All the materials needed are supplied by Crossroads. This is a great opportunity to really serve as Jesus has asked us to do. This is also an excellent opportunity for teens to get community service credits.
